I always pass out a business card!</p>	<p>I plan on meeting with local business owners to encourage them to take a more active role in supporting our students and our schools. I believe this will not only greatly benefit our schools and children, but also our businesses. Building a sense of community, as well as offering opportunity to better prepare students to be excellent future employees or business owners will be a win/win situation. A simple example of this is our son's local gym which provides school supplies for Coweta students</p>

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		<p>in need, as well as funds and gifts for Christmas and birthday presents, Thanksgiving meals and more. They have also been asked to consider mentoring/encouraging students. Other businesses do "Backpack Buddies," providing meals for students needing healthy meals over the weekend. A construction company owner I spoke to talked of how he supplies materials to different school carpentry programs. These are examples of small gifts that can mean a world of difference in a child's and family's life. What would it look like to encourage a greater sense of support and community between local businesses and schools? I believe it could bring more financial support and resources, saving tax dollars, but more importantly, carefully planned and implemented, I believe relationships could be built that could be instrumental in a child's life; especially for those in unstable homes, difficult situations, or students suffering from grief or loss in their lives.</p>
<p>Question 4 List the greatest need(s) in Coweta to continue its prosperity.</p>	<p>We must brag on ourselves. We need to spread the word about our town, but we must protect it. We need to be open and accepting of all people and races. We must continue to offer quality education and a safe environment.</p>	<p>Perhaps one of the greatest dangers is driving growth too quickly and raising taxes to fund it. Higher taxes would hinder growth. Careful fiscal responsibility is important in every area of our county - especially our schools, as they demand such a large percentage of our tax dollars. In talking to local contractors, there is a great need for young carpenters. There are not enough students being trained in our school systems with basic carpentry skills as well as to operate as a foreman /supervisor in construction. We need to see young men and women prepared for the building boom continuing in our county. I believe encouraging more students to pursue apprenticeship programs in carpentry and business/management in construction would be a great asset to our county.</p>

This is the best accomplishment we can offer.</p>	<p>I would like my legacy to have been a catalyst for greater communication, transparency, and local involvement/control given to parents, teachers, educators, and businesses at the local level. I believe local involvement/control of education incorporates the collected wisdom of those who care about our children's success most. This circumvents controlling influences of lobbyists and moneys used to manipulate educational</p>

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		<p>practices and reforms that are not consistent with the voice of parents, teachers and taxpayers. I believe this is a perfect time to pursue this, as our present administration desires to see de-federalized education. To reach this goal, I will communicate regularly with the people of District 1 through social media and quarterly town halls. I will use my contacts at the capitol to stay informed of legislation and communicate needed information to the voters of District 1. In the area of school safety, a needed primary focus in our present culture, greater local involvement will help curtail school violence at the root, by encouraging retired vetted police officers and veterans to volunteer time at the school for a more thorough school watch, while friendships with students can help those students that will benefit greatly from support and encouragement from mentoring friendships with those they respect. I believe this kind of involvement, as well as local business involvement, can transform students' lives, as well as be a deterrent to school violence by dealing with the heart matter of students who feel lost and alone. We saw this kind of transformation when we supported a young man as he faced many challenges and overcame during his high school years in a Coweta County high school.</p>
